

COMMUNITY SAFETY FUNDING

SURREY COUNTY COUNCIL LOCAL COMMITTEE (ELMBRIDGE) 18 JULY 2005

KEY ISSUE:

To confirm the County's 2005-06 financial contribution to the work of the Elmbridge Community Safety Executive Partnership.

SUMMARY:

This report seeks agreement to use the Committee's devolved community safety budget to further the aims of the current strategy.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

That Surrey County Council Local Committee (Elmbridge):

- i) Agree that the budget of £18,000 devolved to the Local Committee for community safety be transferred to the Elmbridge Community Safety Partnership to be spent to further the work of the partnership.
- ii) Agree that an additional £6,000 devolved to the Local Committee specifically to fund work to reduce the incidence of domestic abuse locally, be transferred to the Elmbridge Community Safety Partnership for this purpose.

1 INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 Surrey County Council is a statutory member of the local Crime and Disorder Reduction Partnership (or CDRP, known locally as the Elmbridge Community Safety Partnership) together with the police, the borough council, Surrey Police Authority, Surrey Fire and Rescue Service and the two local primary care trusts or PCTs, (East Elmbridge and Mid Surrey PCT and the North Surrey PCT). The Area Director represents the County Council on the partnership.
- 1.2 The Community Safety Partnership is obliged to produce a three-year Community Safety Strategy to reduce crime locally. The 2005-08 Elmbridge Community Safety Strategy identifies five key issues to be addressed:
 - Violent crime, including domestic abuse
 - Theft
 - Alcohol and drug misuse
 - Anti-social behaviour
 - Arson
- 1.3 The strategy identifies a number of key projects and activities considered essential to address these issues, including working with licensed premises to reduce levels of alcohol related crime and disorder, maximising the use of CCTV, utilising the Joint Action Group to prioritise theft 'hotspots', providing support to adults and young people through the Drug and Alcohol Outreach Worker, deploying Community Wardens and Police Community Support Officers to work in our communities to reduce anti-social behaviour and to provide reassurance, and providing educational initiatives to increase everyone's awareness of the dangers and social impact of arson.

2 FUNDING AND RESOURCES

- 2.1 The CDRP has been allocated a substantial amount of funding from central government that is being administered locally through the Government Office for the South East (GOSE). This money has been targeted across the range of community safety work.
- 2.2 Each of the three original partner organisations (Surrey County Council, Elmbridge Borough Council and Surrey Police) has also allocated a sum annually to be used for projects developed to implement the strategy and in areas where the partnership can add value through joint projects.
- 2.3 As set out in the Scheme of Delegation for Local Committees (Paragraph 6.4.5(f)), the Local Committee has a devolved responsibility for this budget, but it needs to be spent in accordance with the local community safety strategy and in agreement with the other partners.
- 2.4 To support the countywide domestic abuse strategy the Executive have provided additional funding equivalent to £6,000 for each of the eleven boroughs and districts in the county to fund work to reduce domestic abuse. This funding has been provided on the condition that the local crime and

- reduction partnership spend at least an equivalent amount on domestic abuse from their existing budgets.
- 2.5 Further details of the Elmbridge Community Safety Funding Plan 2005/06 are attached as an appendix to this report. The budget is held and administered by Elmbridge Borough Council on behalf of the partnership.

3 DELIVERING THE STRATEGY

3.1 The community safety strategy does not cover all of the community safety activities of the partner organisations but concentrates on the core activities where working in partnership can have a particular impact. Surrey County Council services are involved in various degrees in all these projects.

3.2 Joint Action Group (JAG)

3.2.1 This is a monthly meeting involving a range of agencies that meet to consider crime and related data in respect of identified "hot-spots" across the borough and to jointly agree strategies to minimise or eliminate its impact on the area. Representatives from a variety of County Council services are involved in the JAG, including the Youth Development Service, Fire and Rescue, Trading Standards and Transportation.

3.3 Community Incident Action Group (CIAG)

3.3.1 This is a monthly multi-agency meeting chaired by the police that examines and agrees co-ordinated action to minimise the adverse impact of problem individuals and families upon the wider community. A wide range of agencies participate and jointly they have agreed a number of interventions that have helped to reduce sustained anti-social behaviour.

3.4 Closed Circuit Television (CCTV)

- 3.4.1 The scheme has now been operational for two years and is helping to have a significant impact on crime, disorder and public safety. The latest figures show that, since January 2005, the operators have tracked 873 community safety incidents. During the month of May 2005 the CCTV cameras contributed to 20 arrests, of which 7 are directly attributable to the scheme.
- 3.4.2 During 2005/06 three pilot help-point schemes are planned to be located at Weybridge (junction of Heath Road and Brooklands Lane), West Molesey (Walton Lane, outside Woolworth's) and East Molesey (riverside adjacent to Hampton Court Bridge).
- 3.4.3 It is also proposed for 2005/06 to install cameras in the centre of Hersham, Queens Road (Weybridge) and Walton Halfway. However, with each camera costing approximately £25,000, further funding still needs to be secured before these cameras can be installed.

3.5 Domestic Abuse

3.5.1 Work to minimise the impact of domestic abuse continues to be supported by the Community Safety Partnership, particularly through jointly funding (with the Spelthorne and Epsom & Ewell Community Safety Partnerships) of the North Surrey Domestic Abuse Outreach Service. In the period from October 2003 to March 2005, this service saw 451 clients, 203 of which were from Elmbridge. The majority of clients were women, but 32 were men, and 276 clients had children living in the household.

3.6 Substance Misuse

3.6.1 A range of different initiatives have been funded by the Community Safety Partnership, including activities to reduce and discourage substance misuse, supporting the work of the Surrey Alcohol and Drugs Advisory Service locally, police intelligence activity, and education programmes in local schools.

4 EQUALITIES IMPLICATIONS

4.1 Equalities implications are particularly significant in relation to the involvement of young people both as potential victims and offenders, the high incidence of domestic violence, and tackling the fear of crime, particularly amongst vulnerable groups.

5 CONSULTATION

5.1 The partnership aims to work more closely with local communities to identify priorities.

6 CONCLUSION

6.1 Partnership working is the key to success for community safety. The Elmbridge Community Safety Partnership is a major partnership initiative and significant progress has been made in delivering the objectives of the previous three year strategy. The Partnership has been particularly successful in attracting resources from a variety of sources to help meet these objectives as well as in combining and targeting existing resources so that they will have the greatest effect.
