The level of those who quit in 2009/10 was 69.47% compared to the best borough Spelthorne at 130.49%. In 2008/09 the 27.2% of the population of Walton North smoked, in Walton Ambleside this was 25.2% and in Molesey South it was 25.3%.

Joint Strategic Needs Assessment

As well as the Hidden Surrey report which highlights high levels of older people suffering deprivation in the County living in Walton North and Molesey South, Elmbridge generally has a higher than average number of people over 75 living in the Borough.

<u>SCC Heat Mapping and Indices of Multiple Deprivation</u> Income deprivation affecting children Walton Ambleside (39.1% and Walton North (36.4%) are identified as high need areas. Lower Green has (31.3%).

<u>Surrey Fire and Rescue Service Borough Plan</u> Cobham Fairmile and St Johns (Walton) are prioritised for addressing unwanted calls and St Johns is also identified as a priority area for reducing arson.

Surrey Police Crime statistics for Elmbridge

Around half the residents of Walton North and Walton Ambleside aired concerns that young people hang around in groups, which have an intimidating effect, have nothing to do and some as young as 7 are out late at night. These are all instigators for problem behaviour in these areas.

NOMIS

In February 2010, the proportion of people claiming out of work benefits was 9.9% in Molesey South, 9.3% in Walton Ambleside and 11% in Walton North compared to a Surrey average of 6.4%

North Surrey Domestic Abuse Outreach Service

The highest number of referrals to this service came from Walton North and Molesey South.

<u>Surrey County Council Childrens' Centre designation</u> Walton North has an area 8 level Children's Centre at Grovelands School

National Indicators

NI 117 (Number of people aged 16-18 NEET) – In February 2010 Walton North (21) was identified as high need with Molesey South (12) of relatively high need.

NI 75 (% of pupils attaining A* -C) - Both Cobham Fairmile (44%) and Lower Green (50%) were identified as high need areas

Education

Walton Oak School in Walton Ambleside receives amongst the highest level of social enhancement funding (ranked as 4th most deprived in Surrey for 2009/10). It also has a higher than average number of pupils claiming free school meals (24%) and of pupils with English as an additional language currently 15%.

• Provide the Community champions with the tools to be able to take control of their communities. This will be done by supporting them to identify imaginative and sustainable solutions to issues identified by the communities using Total Place principles and Community engagement tools such as the Surrey Community Engagement Framework and Tenant Services Authority new model approach to tackling entrenched behaviour on small housing estates. (The end of regeneration: improving what matters on small housing estates) VAE has copies of this paper. The communities will also be assisted in harnessing funding streams from Health, Local and County Councils and other funders, based on a 'Total Place' model in which all authorities would be encouraged to work together.	
As there is currently no one person who has either the knowledge or time to help engage with these communities in a sustainable and supportive manner, the employment of a Community Development Worker (CDW) will be the catalyst for these communities, enabling the setting up of projects and the bringing in of other services to help improve these communities.	
This project will encourage personal responsibility and by working together and delivering services locally it is hoped that the environment for these communities will improve their lifestyle choices and increased access to appropriate services.

The CDW will then be working with the communities, giving them the support they need to enable be resident's to take control of their community activities and opjects. • The CDW will be based within the communities to establish a presence/rapport with the residents. With the help of steering group partners, who through in kind support will be providing places for the CDW to work from within the communities, the CDW will be able to build up the trust and knowledge needed to help the residents identify their own needs, requirements and concerns.	
• The community champions would be from the residents themselves, people who express an interest in working with the CDW to improve their neighbourhoods. In this way residents are an integral part of the project.	
• With support from VAE and the 305 voluntary, community and Faith organisations listed as members, the CDW will be able to use the expertise of these organisations to help benefit the communities.	
• The CDW will ensure that all activities and developments adhere to equal opportunities, diversity and health and safety polices so that no one in these communities are discriminated against.	
• The CDW would be accountable to the Chief Executive of VAE and the Elmbridge Community Partnership, which includes elected members, business, police and fire representatives, and would act as the initial link between the organisations and the community champions during the length of the project fostering good relationships between them.

The work that VAE carries out on a daily basis with its members such as Homestart, Surrey Crossroads and Multi-faith forum and the engagement of the Voluntary, Community and Faith sector in these communities will help to ensure that residents are able to take control and responsibility for their own communities.	
By identifying lead contacts and other bodies such as Health professionals and Leisure services officers the CDW will enable the residents to identify activities which they can take responsibility for in a regular and sustainable manner.	
Assisted by VAE where access will be made available to a funding database, the CDW will help find funding opportunities that will lead to sustainable 'communities in control' with the co-operation of local, regional and national stakeholders.	
Q10 How will you measure your success in carrying out the activities and achieving the outcomes you have set out above?	We don't want to create reporting burdens so do keep systems simple, realistic and informative.
It is important to bear in mind that each area has different challenges and environments and are of varying sizes it is intended that the results for each area will reflect the level of current engagement. For example, much has already been achieved in Lower Green and whilst there is still a great deal to be done to enable the sustainability of this work the need here is for	

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more development support where as the community in South Molesey has yet to begin to assess its needs and requirements but also has a more ethnically diverse population.

<u>Voluntary Action Elmbridge</u> will be the lead partner. Facilitating the recruitment of key community voluntary, community and faith sector champions in each area such as Home Start, Residents Associations, Love of Learning, CABs. Following completion of the projects in 2012, to provide support/link for the community champions and to support residents in developing new or existing groups into more formalised bodies for example the setting up of social enterprises/charities where appropriate.

<u>Elmbridge Community Partnership</u> – Monitor and support the projects and identify areas of need for the community champions. To provide continuity as well as to enable the partners such as the Elmbridge Business network to engage with these communities.

<u>Elmbridge Borough Council</u> – To respond to need in leisure, housing benefits and council tax as well as informing the engagement of elected members with the communities.

<u>Elmbridge Housing Trust</u> – To provide a key link to other housing trusts; to provide engagement, expertise, in kind support

<u>Walton on Thames Charity</u> – Extra support and sustainability for the projects linked to their charitable objects which may include some financial support

<u>Surrey Fire and Rescue Services/Elmbridge Area Director</u> – Community Engagement, providing YES Courses, Community Development Days. Links to the community.

<u>Surrey Police/ Elmbridge Borough Inspector</u>- Provision of data, Community presence, provide role model

<u>Surrey LLP</u> will work with the group to engage and set up skills and learning where need is identified.

<u>Surrey County Council</u> – Links and contacts to services, guidance and access to newly emerging funding streams

<u>NHS Surrey</u> – Health issues identification and solutions as well as access to emerging funding streams
