This was alongside students from the UCA and officers at EEBC. Sam and Louise are in discussions regarding launching a similar scheme for schools with the children developing a winning design and painting another ramp. Sam has collected a number of details from young people interested in the 'Protect my Space' campaign. She is now in talks with the youth PCSO to establish how they can support the project before she officially launches it. Sam is looking for it to be used as a means of reparation and has spoken with the Police about the possibility of it being used in the Intervention Clinics. PA
