Summary

The principle of Young Farmers is that the members run their own clubs, of which there are 7 across Surrey, and also the county federation. This enables members to develop key life skills. To kick start and accelerate this development we run an Annual Development programme. This includes a series of events such as Junior and Senior development weekends, Competitions Days, and Club and County Officer training.

Through these actual overall skills such as team work, planning and organising and leadership are gained. Other specific skills such as crafts, cooking, public reading/speaking, and self presentation in an interview situation are also gained. In addition our members develop a sense of achievement, feel valued, enjoy contributing and participating and take responsibility for themselves.

Description of the project. What difference will this make?	The Guildford City Youth Project provides formal Cricket Training and participation in leagues to young people who do not have access to formal coaching and structured participation otherwise. A high percentage of the young people come from a variety of ethnic	

	backgrounds. Cricket forms an important part of their culture. With the erosion of their traditional background many of these young people find themselves with extensive spare time and often gravitate to street gangs. While these gangs in Surrey are not necessarily violent they do tend to polarise their members in distinct ethnic groups with little understanding of other cultures. The parents are particularly anxious to provide structured alternatives. Cricket is seen as particularly helpful as (unlike other sports) it provides opportunities for young cricketers of different backgrounds to spend prolonged periods of time in each other's company (which does promote understanding) and also enables them to value each other on merit. The involvement of the parents in social and fundraising events also helps to promote understanding (we currently have cricketers / parents from English / Pakistani / Indian / Sri Lankan / West Indian / South African and Dutch backgrounds). The parents asked if we could widen the project and so we are setting up apprenticeships for coaching. Our existing senior coaches train and mentor the apprentices and involve them in coaching sessions as well as providing individual tuition. The apprentices are trained to ECB Level 1 examinations at the end of the year. This additional objective is to assist these newly qualified coaches to set up training sessions in their own areas on the same multi race basis (with assistance from the Youth Project) and also to provide them with a means of earning. Cricket, because of its unusual nature, does facilitate improvement of confidence and self-esteem.

Bid for Youth small Grants April 2012

To Retain and Encourage Youngsters into Adult Cricket

What will be done?

Current situation

The club has some potential 300 junior members for the 2012 season ranging from 7-18 years of age, with approximately 40 between the ages of 14 -18. The challenges faced with such a diversity of physicality and skill levels places a huge burden on the space and facility requirements of the club. The club as a member of the "Club Mark" scheme has to provide coaching to a standard imposed by the ECB. Whilst the club has gone some way toward providing a safe environment, by moving the practice sessions for the younger members to a Thursday, we still have to accommodate the age groups of 11-18 on a Friday night.

Target situation

Whilst it might seem a simple solution to further separate the practice sessions to provide for the required facilities. The club has to be able to provide facilities for matches throughout the week for both junior and adult fixtures and this pressure makes it impossible to take this action. The solution the club proposes is to hire a local pitch for practice on Friday nights with 2 qualified coaches. We further would propose upgrading our own nets to make it possible for older juniors to practice alongside more junior members and also to provide some additional training equipment. We further recognise that some of the over 16 players would like to be able to take a coaching qualification and therefore would also propose to mentor 2 students through a level 1 qualification in cricket coaching. We feel that, by promoting coaching

skills in young adults, we are encouraging them to take an active part in society as a whole and hope that they will also wish to be part of the local community and be active within our club.

To become sustainable the ultimate aim is to grow the number of players within the club from the bottom up so that the number of members in this age group and their membership fees make the financial situation sustainable and to encourage the investment of their own time in becoming contributing members of the club and community by going on courses to be qualified coaches and support personnel (Coaching Assistance, umpires, scorers etc).

The submission

The History

The club has developed over the last few years and by its endeavours, achieving the Cricket "Club Mark" status, for coaching. As a result it has become a product of its own success attracting junior players from a wide catchment area. This has created the pressure on the current club facilities. Last year in order to relieve the pressure the club spent additional resources in hiring additional space and coaches. The result was a financial loss for the club. There has also been more legislation placed on the club in achieving the Club Mark status and the requirement to provide additional facilities for the increasing number of junior members. This has been created by the clubs own developing success and has resulted in a cricket club that young players and parents wish to be associated with.

The Overall Plan

To provide facilities for this season to enable the 14-18 year old players to have separate facility to practice. The plan will become sustainable when the follow seasons, the current 13 year old players, who number some 30, move up and the increased membership fee income, therefore allowing the situation to become sustainable.

 expenditure and hire of equipment to enable the volunteers to
 carry out the works themselves.
- The Equipment cost

 - 2. 2 sets of medium catch nets for throwing practice, equipment to be used at the hired pitch and
 - 3. 3 new rebound nets for close-catching practice.

What will be done?

The project that the squadron is requesting funding for is in order to build and develop its adventure training and sporting activities on the squadron.

The activities that this project is intended to benefit at this stage are: two Duke of Edinburgh Award expeditions over the summer 2012, a weekend adventure camp in the October half term, and a series of day and overnight activities during the Summer holidays to train for the October camp.

The squadron currently has an extensive programme of adventure training and sports events but at the present time only a small number of cadets can be taken on these activities. This is due to a number of factors but mainly due to logistics and equipment available to be utilised. For example, the squadron has two minibuses which enables the cadets to be transported to where required but there is no space to take any equipment. The squadron is in desperate need of a trailer to transport equipment so that the entire squadron and their equipment can be transported to events to enable all of the young people of 261 to benefit from the activities offered. Presently activities are limited to a certain number to allow for space for equipment.

The difference this will make will be vast. It would enable the squadron to travel as an entire unit and the training provided can be offered to all instead of a select few which would lead to some young people being left out. Most importantly those that don't feel confident will be able to attend weekends in order to receive further training and benefit fully from squadron arranged activities.

The project is also aimed at arranging the adventure training weekends in more challenging terrain and environments. In order to achieve this further training is required along with the need for more advanced technical equipment to allow expeditions at this level. There is also the need for additional safety equipment to allow these activities to run.

Previously the squadron has aimed activities at the junior level of

young person, however this has left out senor cadets who would want to carry out these more advanced techniques. There has also been occasions where young people have missed out on training and learning because of logistical issues. Along with the issues mentioned above, if this project is successful it would allow to squadron to attend two activities at once due to the increased transport options, whereas previously all of the squadrons transport would have to attend the same event. It has been highlighted previously that the senior cadets loose interest in the Corps more easily and there is the need to plan events to cater primarily for these young people to keep them interested in the Corps to avoid them dropping out and loosing the opportunities that the Air Training Corps offers.

Finally, the young people of 261 are currently unable to utilise modern technology to the best of their ability in order to plan and report on the activities that they plan and participate in. Part of this project is also to allow the cadets to plan their expeditions using all the latest electronic mapping software but to also to prepare and present reports on the activities experienced. These reports can then be shared with local media, websites and prospective cadets to the squadron.

Overall this project will make a large difference to the squadron and activities planned and carried out. Whereas before focus was put on the more junior cadets this project aims to involve the entire squadron whether it be on the same event or the ability to arrange separate events at the same time. It will also allow the cadets to experience the modern planning tool available and to share their experiences with the rest of the local young people.

Skillway was founded to fill the gap where mainstream education was unable to provide for the complex needs of every young person being educated in a strict academic environment and where they were either disadvantaged by the system, or had significant learning difficulties. Our team of dedicated and highly experienced skilled craftsmen and women inspire young people aged 14 to 16 to discover their true capabilities and to apply these in a disciplined but exciting workshop environment. Students, who often join us feeling very disillusioned with their educational experiences, are encouraged to engage with our stimulating training environment.

Most of our students are from schools in South West Surrey. They enjoy a one year foundation course in various manual skills under the tutelage of our skilled craftsmen and if selected can progress to our second year Master Class. It is our aim to find 'work experience' in local businesses for motivated applicants and/or employment and apprenticeship schemes.

Our training provides students with an introduction to develop key manual skills and to encourage them to develop these skills further both at Skillway and through opportunities with further training and apprenticeships. Our ethos of providing a foundation in skills not available through mainstream education provides the additional benefits of building self-esteem, encouraging character development and

providing an environment involving team-building and an understanding of routine and work ethic. It is particularly beneficial to those with learning difficulties and those who are so disillusioned they are classing themselves as "failures".
