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<p>Leatherhead Drama Festival 2012</p> <p>£2,000 revenue</p> <p>Cllr Tim Hall</p>	<p>The Festival is a competitive event for up to 28 amateur drama groups, both Junior and Adult participants; run over two weeks in May with a public audience and in front of a professional adjudicator (Member of the Guild of Drama Adjudicators – GoDA). All competitors are encouraged to develop and showcase their thespian talents in presenting a short play (up to 55 minutes long) at the Leatherhead Theatre, and in so doing, entertain the audience. Winning groups re-perform at the Gala Awards Night and will receive their trophies from our Patron, Sir Michael Caine CBE. This festival is affiliated to the National Drama Festivals Association – NDFA) and in only eight years, has become the biggest drama festival of its type in the UK.</p> <p>The continued demand by drama groups for entry into the Festival together with the significant level of audience support demonstrate the need for such a Festival.</p>	<p>Funding has been received from SCC (Local Committee) for each year of the Festival since 2004; the sums being between £1,500 and £2,500 per year.</p>	<p>As a member of NDFA and affiliated to GoDA we have been in constant contact with these associations and their officers and we use their experience and support throughout our planning and organisation.</p>
