

# REPORT TO LOCAL COMMITTEE (RUNNYMEDE) MEMBER ALLOCATIONS FUNDING 2 OCTOBER 2009

### **KEY ISSUE**

To set out the funding available for County Councillors' allocations for 2009/10 and consider for decision the requests received.

### **SUMMARY**

This report lists and makes recommendations on bids received for Members' Allocations, which have been sponsored by at least one Member.

This report is for decision.

## **OFFICER RECOMMENDATIONS**

The Local Committee (Runnymede) is asked to:

- i) Consider and agree the proposed expenditure (described in paragraphs 2.2 to 2.8) from the Members' Allocation budget;
- ii) Note the expenditure approved by the Area Director under delegated powers, as described at 3.1.

### INTRODUCTION AND BACKGROUND

- 1.1 The County Council's budget for 2009/10 made available £49,500 member allocations funding to be spent on local projects to promote the social, environmental or economic well-being of the people of Runnymede. The budget amounts to £8,250 revenue for each County Member of the Committee.
- 1.2 An additional capital allocation of £35,000 has been made available to each Surrey County Council Local Committee.
- 1.3 Member allocation funding is made to organisations on a one-off basis, so that there should be no expectation of future funding for the same or similar purpose. Where organisations have received funding in previous years for a similar purpose as currently proposed, this is indicated below the proposal details.
- 1.4 Members have agreed to divide the capital funding of £35,000 equally between the six county councillors when making proposals for funding. This capital should be used wherever there is a project which meets the criteria for capital funding, before revenue is accessed.
- 1.5 Member allocations should support the County Council's Corporate plan 2009/10 Working Together Making Surrey a better place. The county council's values remain: to be forward thinking, responsive and reliable, working with others and giving value for money. The Plan sets out the following priorities for the current year:

Protecting vulnerable children and young people Helping adults to live independently and safely Minimising and recycling waste Improving Surrey's roads Working to keep Surrey's economy successful

2.1 Each project detailed below has completed a standard application form giving further details of timescales, purpose and other funding applications made. The member proposing each project assesses its merits, before the project can be included as a proposal for funding in the report to Committee.

### 2.2 CARERS SUPPORT CHRISTMAS LUNCH

Project Cost £1250

Amount requested £1000 Revenue

**Summary of Proposal** 

Carers Support Runnymede has requested a subsidy of £20 per head towards a Christmas lunch for 50 carers from across the borough, with the carers themselves paying £5 per head. This social event will give carers a break from their responsibilities and reduce their sense of isolation.

### 2.3 "COPPERS FOR BRASS": MUSIC AT ST JUDE'S SCHOOL

Project Cost £3,402 Amount requested £1000 Summary of Proposal

Under the "Tuning Up" initiative, in 2008 the whole of Year 4 at St Jude's school received free musical tuition on brass instruments, but there is limited subsidy available in 2009-10 so schools must find a contribution by fundraising if they wish to offer the same chance to this year's Year 4. The school/PTA has raised £1,500 already and the remainder is requested from the Local Committee. (The senior schools finance officer confirms that this is not core-curriculum funded and is therefore eligible for member allocation).

### 2.4 EIKON: RESIDENTIAL FOR YOUNG PEOPLE FEBRUARY 2010

Project Cost £3245

Amount requested £1850

**Summary of Proposal** 

Eikon works with young people in the New Haw and surrounding areas, through Fullbrook School, and targets help at vulnerable young people who lack confidence or have family difficulties. The residential for 20 young people from Year 7 at an outdoor activity centre in Kent next February requires funding for food, transport, activities and staff/volunteer costs and a contribution is requested from the Local Committee.

Eikon received funding towards residential activity trips for Summer 2007.

# 2.5 SURREY POLICE – PURCHASE OF PEDAL CYCLES FOR NEIGHBOURHOOD OFFICERS

The neighbourhood sergeant, responding to requests from the public for more visible patrols by neighbourhood officers in the Egham and Thorpe areas, has asked for funding to purchase four fully-equipped mountain bikes for use by his officers. Surrey Police have given assurances that the cycles will be retained in this neighbourhood for use long-term.

# 2.6 EAST TO WEST: LAPTOP AND PRINTER FOR AFTER-SCHOOL AND NEET CLUBS

Project Cost £2000 Amount requested £2000 Summary of proposal

East2West's community youth worker is running a weekly after-school club for years 7 and 8 at Magna Carta school (supported by volunteers) and has requested this funding to purchase a laptop and supporting equipment to use at this club and also at a new drop-in for young people who are not in education, training or employment.

### 2.7 OTTERSHAW VILLAGE HALL: ACCESSIBLE ENTRANCE WORKS

Amount requested £4000
Summary of proposal

The organisation responsible for managing the village hall, which is well used by local members of the public, plan to undertake refurbishment works in spring/summer 2010 and as part of this programme of works would like to remodel the main entrance pathways, provide a ramp and more user-friendly entrance doors which are thermally efficient. These improvements will be of particular benefit to people with pushchairs and mobility impairments.

### 2.8 RAVS FACADE AND SIGNAGE IMPROVEMENTS

Project Cost £2254 Amount requested £2000 Summary of proposal

The Runnymede Association of Voluntary Services has a shopfront premises adjacent to the Sainsbury Centre in Chertsey, and has identifed a need to professionalise and improve its interior and exterior signage in order to attract more volunteers and to promote local voluntary sector events effectively. This funding will largely pay for permanent signage, alongside a contribution from the local auction house.

# 3.0 PROPOSALS APPROVED UNDER DELEGATED POWERS SINCE LAST MEETING

3.1 Following the June meeting of the Local Committee, the Area Director, under powers delegated to them by the Committee, approved an application from Runnymede Borough Council for £150 revenue, from Mrs Angell's allocation, to pay for new street signs in Weybourne Way adjacent to the new community building at All Saints Church.
