

## Runnymede – 14-19 (25) Needs Analysis Summary

### 1 Recent progress in Runnymede and Surrey

In May 2010, at 50%, Runnymede had a high proportion of young people who had been NEET for 12 weeks or less, and, at 13%, a low proportion who had been NEET for 39 weeks or more.

In 2008/9, the percentage of students who achieved five A\*-C GCSE grades in Runnymede was above the Surrey average, which was itself eight percent above the national average.

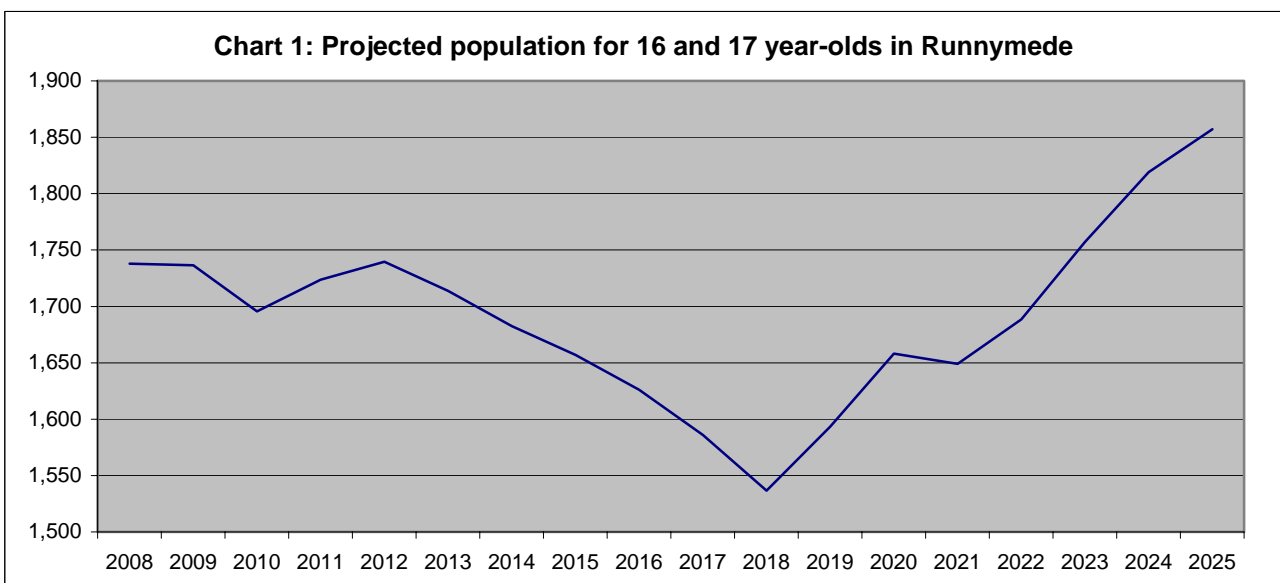
Over the last five years, Surrey’s performance has continuously improved in terms of numbers achieving levels 2 and 3 by 16 and 19, as well as narrowing the inequality gap.

Between 2007/8 and 2008/9, rate of participation at 16 improved from 88% to 91% and at 17 from 79% to 81%.

### 2 Possible areas for development

- Runnymede had a high proportion of known young carers in September 2009.
- Egham Hythe had high numbers of young people in employment without training, in May 2010.
- In 2008/9, the borough had the second highest proportion of school age population with less than 80% attendance, as well as a high proportion of pupils who had experienced a permanent exclusion or three or more fixed term exclusions.
- ‘Runnymede 006D’ in Chertsey St Ann’s has the highest score in Surrey for education, training and skills deprivation in the Indices of Multiple Deprivation 2007.

#### 4.1 Not in education, employment, or training (NEET)

Surrey had the lowest level of NEET of all its Statistical Neighbours, in May 2010.

Runnymede had the fifth highest proportion of young people who were NEET in Surrey.

Half of young people who were NEET in Runnymede had held that status for 12 weeks or less, a proportion higher than most other districts and boroughs in the County.

#### Priority wards for NEET

- In May 2010, no wards in Runnymede had more than 10 young people who were known to be NEET. Woodham had the highest number followed by Chertsey Meads, Egham Hythe and Englefield West.

- Between June and December 2009, Egham Hythe had between 13 and 20 young people who were NEET. This was one of the highest levels in Surrey.

## **4.2 Employment without training (EWT)**

Runnymede had the fourth lowest actual number of young people in EWT in Surrey. Given Runnymede's relatively small population size, the borough had the second highest proportion of young people who were in EWT, in May 2010.

### **Priority wards for EWT**

- Egham Hythe ranked ninth highest in Surrey, with 23 young people who were known to be in EWT. This was nearly 20% of the borough's EWT total.
- Woodham had 15 young people in EWT, whilst Addlestone Bourneside had 14 and Thorpe had 13.

## **4.3 Unknowns**

Runnymede had the third lowest number of young people whose current activity was unknown.

### **Priority wards for unknowns**

Egham Hythe had the 20<sup>th</sup> highest number of young people whose activity was unknown (11 young people), followed by Chertsey St. Ann's with 10 young people.

## **5 Vulnerable and other relevant groups**

Residents in Runnymede expressed concern about alcohol abuse, and particularly how hazardous drinking levels may impact on young people growing up in such an environment.

Between March 2006 and March 2009, Egham Hythe was one of the 20 wards in Surrey with the highest number of young people who became looked after.

Runnymede had the second highest number of known Gypsy, Roma and Traveller children and young people in Surrey in September 2009.

Runnymede has a noticeably higher number of known young carers than would be anticipated given its population size, as well as higher numbers of first-time offenders and children in care.

In 2008/9 the borough had the second highest proportion of its school age population with less than 80% attendance, as well as the highest proportion of pupils who have been permanently excluded or had three or more fixed term exclusions.

## 6 Economy and workforce

The super output area 'Runnymede 006D' in Chertsey St Ann's has the highest score in Surrey for education, training and skills deprivation according to the Indices of Multiple Deprivation 2007. The proportion of people employed in 'Banking, finance and insurance, etc' is nearly 5% above the proportion for the whole of Surrey.
