Principally Haslemere district incorporating Haslemere town and neighbouring villages such as Chiddingfold Grayswood and Beacon Hill

The funding for transport is for Young parents in Chiddingfold

There are two areas of relative disadvantage in Haslemere: the Sicklemill Estate and the High Lane Estate. The former is contained in Super Output Area (SOA) 17C and ranks 15th in Waverley (out of 82) in the 2007 Index of Multiple Deprivation (IMD) and 19th in the Child Well-being Index (CWI) 2009; the IMD rankings for Health, Education, Skills and Training and Income Deprivation Affecting Children are 13th, 15th and 13th

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respectively. The High Lane Estate is spread across two SOAs (16C and 16D): 16C ranks at 17th in the CWI and 18th for Income Deprivation Affecting Children. However, it is recognized that disadvantage in Waverley often occurs in very small pockets and an analysis of the 2001 census for the relevant Census Output Areas shows that part of the High Lane Estate ranked third in Waverley in terms of those factors most likely to lead to disadvantage in families with children and young people.

We have had 20 young parents attend our group since it started.

Chiddingfold has been classified as a hard to reach area and Beacon Hill is an area with barriers to accessing services.

We have three young parents who would like to access our

group from Chiddingfold, but are unable to due to lack of transport.

Q6 Describe the project or activities you are seeking funding for

Healthy Living 1 year project for our young parents to include: Healthy Eating Cookery course – cooking skills, budgeting, growing own, recipes for life

Food hygiene course for staff and young parents

Health and Well being course – supporting depression and low self esteem

Termly/on request sexual health clinics

Healthy lifestyles course including alcohol, smoking and substance misuse

Exercising and relaxation – stress, yoga, massage

Transport for 1 year for our Chiddingfold Young parents so they can access our group and support services and hopefully the above Healthy Living project. Briefly describe the proposed actions and the activities that will be undertaken; explain how the project would offer something new to the area

Improved education around lifestyle and healthy choices for all the family members – fewer children becoming overweight and obese.

Improved sexual health in young parents and reduction of teenage pregnancies. C card scheme and clamidyia screening programme

Increased capacity of parents to support themselves and their children – recipes for life, budgeting and weekly food

Avoiding becoming NEET – food hygiene course supporting young parents to work in a café, restaurant and increase take up of training opportunities gaining basic cookery skills/courses – health and hygiene

Increase access to safe places to exercise and for leisure – increase confidence by trying different things and finding out what is available.

Young parents in a hard to reach area accessing our services.

The Local Committee (Waverley) has received regular reports, most recently at its meetings on 13 October 2006 (Item 17), 14 December 2007 (Item 13), 4 December 2009 (Item 12). The minutes of the December 2009 meeting note that "Members welcomed the report and endorsed the need both for continuing awareness of the pockets of disadvantage within Waverley and for support to sustain the progress made to date, especially in developing an environment in which communities can be strengthened through resident involvement." While the Committee has concentrated its efforts on the three or four areas of greatest disadvantage in Waverley it has nevertheless continued to note the needs of other neighbourhoods facing challenges throughout the borough, noting the needs of communities in Haslemere on 12 December 2003 (Item 22) and in its 14 December 2007 report.

The Committee has regularly endorsed its commitment to its existing priority areas and reinforced this by many grants from its revenue and capital budgets to support local projects; it has also supported the priority given to strengthening these communities in borough-wide strategic plans and ensured that relevant links are made by County Council services. More generally, the Committee has consistently encouraged services to demonstrate what they have done to address the needs of all communities of place and interest in the borough which experience disadvantage
