

OFFICER REPORT TO LOCAL COMMITTEE (WOKING)

ALLOCATING LOCAL COMMITTEE FUNDING: MEMBERS' ALLOCATIONS

9 FEBRUARY 2011

KEY ISSUE

To set out the funding available for county councillors' allocations for 2010/11 and to consider the requests received.

SUMMARY

This report lists and makes recommendations on bids received for members' allocations which have been sponsored by at least one member.

OFFICER RECOMMENDATIONS

The local committee (Woking) is asked to:

- i. Consider and approve the proposed expenditure from the members' allocation budget 2010/11 as set out in para 3.1 including the reallocation as set out in para 3.2.
- ii. Note that there were no allocations approved under delegated powers between the last local committee on 20 October 2010 and 9 February 2011.

1 INTRODUCTION AND BACKGROUND

Members Allocation

- 1.1 The County Council's budget for 2010/11 made available £57,750 to be spent on local projects to promote the social, environmental or economic well-being of the people of Woking. This amounts to £8,250 revenue for each county member of the committee.
- 1.2 An additional capital allocation of £30,000 has been made available to each Surrey County Council local committee.
- 1.3 Two projects have indicated that they no longer need the funding allocated to them. Knaphill Residents Association has returned £885 as the Christmas in Knaphill project did not take place. The Woking Malayalee Association did not use the £1000 that was allocated to them as they managed to secure funding from Woking Borough Council to fund the Onam celebrations. A total of £1885 has been added to the revenue fund.
- 1.4 Members of local committee (Woking) agreed at the meeting on 7 July 2010 to pool available funds, and that as a guideline, to set a limit of £3,000 for bids to both the capital and revenue funds, but noting the committee may make an exception for larger borough wide schemes.
- 1.5 In allocating funds members are asked to have regard to Surrey County Council's Corporate Strategy 2010-14 *Making A Difference*, it highlights five themes which make Surrey special and which it seeks to maintain:
 - a safe place to live;
 - a high standard of education;
 - a beautiful environment;
 - a vibrant economy
 - a healthy population
- 1.6 Member allocation funding is made to organisations on a one-off basis, so that there should be no expectation of future funding for the same or similar purpose.

2 ANALYSIS

2.1 Each project detailed below has completed a standard application form giving further details of timescales, purpose and other funding applications made. The member proposing each project assesses its merits, before the project can be included as a proposal for funding in the report to committee.

3 OPTIONS

3.1 Bids received

The table below shows all bids received which have been sponsored by at least one member. They are therefore all eligible for decision by the local committee.
