
6. Elmbridge

Education in Elmbridge

6.1 There are 28 primary age schools in Elmbridge, 7 of which have nursery provision. There are 4 secondary schools three with post-16 provision. Brooklands College has a campus in Weybridge and to the east of the Borough is Esher Sixth Form College. There is also a Special School for children and young people with severe, profound and multiple learning difficulties located near Weybridge and a Short Stay School located in Hersham. Maps at the end of this section give an overview of the educational provision that is available in the Borough. This includes all Primary and Secondary Schools in the Borough. Locations of all Special School, Short Stay School, Sixth form/College provision in Elmbridge is provided in appendix B

Planning areas in Elmbridge

- 6.2 Elmbridge is made up of 6 individual primary planning areas as identified on the map. Each primary age school is allocated to one of these planning areas and projections of need for primary school places are made based on the transfer rates of the number of births in each planning area compared to the number of reception year pupils there are 4 years later.
- 6.3 Elmbridge is a single secondary planning area. This means that demand for secondary places is estimated across the whole Borough.



PRIMARY

Historic numbers of primary pupils in Elmbridge

6.4 The table below provides historical information on the total number of available primary places in Reception in Elmbridge (the PAN), compared to the actual pupils in reception year. This provides the number of spare places across the Borough (a negative figure shows a shortage of places compared with the current PAN). Parental preferences are given to indicate the demand for places each year. There has been a shortage of reception places in parts of Elmbridge since 2007. Parental preference for reception places in the Borough is high but is offset by a number of parents not taking up places offered and instead choosing the independent sector.

Actions that were taken to provide primary places in September 2011


6.5 Permanent provision was made at Oatlands Infant School to allow it to expand to 90 places a year from 2011 and 20 additional places were confirmed for Orchard School. Temporary provision was provided at Burhill Infant School, St Andrews Primary School and Hinchley Wood Primary School to enable each to admit an additional class. Additional provision was made at Cranmere Primary School to allow it to continue to admit 60 pupils a year.

Births in Elmbridge

6.6 Based on figures provided by the Office for National Statistics, births in Elmbridge have fluctuated around 1500 per annum for a number of years. More recently, birth rates have increased reaching 1844 births in 2010 – an increase of 26% since 2001. This increase in births will lead to a continuously increasing number of children starting primary and secondary schools in Elmbridge in the foreseeable future. It should be noted that the increase is unlikely to be evenly spread across the Borough. Therefore some areas in Elmbridge will experience more pressure for school places than others.

Elmbridge Forecasts

6.7 The need for primary school places depends on the local child population. The key factor is the number of births in an area. Pressure for primary places lags 4 years behind changes in the birth rate, and pressure for secondary places follows another 7 years later. The table below identifies the demand for reception places in Elmbridge to 2011 and the estimated need for places in the future (to 2016). The increase in births in Elmbridge will lead to an increase in demand for school places at both primary level and at secondary level in the longer-term.

6.8 The table below estimates the number of pupils that will require a reception place in a primary school in Elmbridge from 2012 – 2021. This is compared with the total number of available places in Elmbridge in the future (the PAN). The 'spare reception places' column refers to the projected demand compared with the total number of available places in the reception year.

6.9 On the basis of the known increase in birth rate and projected housing completions, the number of children entering primary schools in Elmbridge is set to continue to increase over the next 10 years and result in an increasing shortage of places to 2021.

Actions taken to provide primary places in 2012 and implications for the future planning period

- 6.10 The number of on-time, first preference applications for 2012 were higher than for 2011. Further 'bulge' classes were therefore provided in 2012 at Hurst Park, Burhill Infant, Cranmere, Hinchley Wood, Thames Ditton Infant, Manby Lodge and St Andrew's.
- 6.11 To date, additional permanent places have been provided at Ashley CE Primary School in Walton, Oatlands Infant School in Weybridge and Orchard Infant School in Molesey. Bell Farm also took its first infant class of 30 pupils in September 2012.





- 6.12 Forecasts suggest that a further seven forms of entry (one form = 30 pupils) per year may be required by the end of the forecast period, five forms by 2014 and six forms by 2015.
- 6.13 Although the need will not be distributed evenly across the Borough, all areas in Elmbridge are projected to experience a shortfall in places over the next ten years. The Dittons and Weston Green is expected to have the greatest need for additional provision, followed by, in order: Walton and Hersham; Cobham & Oxshott; Moleseys, Weybridge and Esher and Claygate. It should be noted that there is usually an overflow of pupils across adjacent primary planning areas both inside and outside of the Borough and the pattern of applications can be affected by the previous year's availability of places. Therefore the shortfalls described above may not all need to be acted upon. For example, Cobham & Oxshott is forecast to have a shortfall of places. However, there is degree of pupil movement between this area and the adjacent Fetcham & Bookham area in Mole valley District and the Horsleys & Effingham area in Guildford Borough. Where there is pressure of places in a planning area, subject to reasonable travelling distances, the Local Authority will seek to manage this pressure in adjacent planning areas where possible.
- 6.14 Two additional forms of entry have been approved for the Walton area (through the creation of primary schools at Burhill Infants, Bell Farm Juniors and Grovelands Infants); one form was established in 2012 and a further 2 forms will be in place by 2013.
- 6.15 Two additional forms are being planned for the Dittons and Weston Green area by 2014.
- 6.16 Additional forms are being considered for both the Cobham area and the Molesey area. The effect of the Cobham Free (primary) school on the need for places locally will need to be monitored. A further form for the Weybridge area is also under consideration. It is possible that a further form will be needed to broadly serve the Molesey/Esher/Dittons areas.
- 6.17 In advance of additional permanent places being created, 'bulge classes' will continue to be provided where necessary.

Accuracy of Primary forecasts

- 6.18 It is useful to understand how accurate the forecasts are year on year. This is done by comparing the number of reception pupils that were allocated a place in Elmbridge in 2011 compared with the number that was forecast in the previous year.
- 6.19 In Elmbridge, there were 29 more reception pupils in 2011 than indicated by the November 2010 forecast, which was an under-estimate of 2%. Forecasts are affected by the provision of Reception places in previous years. The forecasts are based on historic trends, so where Reception numbers increase owing to a step-change in places available, and these places are taken up, there is a significant increase in numbers in an area. The historic trend will include this increase in numbers and, therefore, tend to overestimate numbers in that area by assuming they will continue to





increase. In areas where numbers have not increased significantly in line with previous forecasts, there will be a decreased trend, and future numbers will then tend to be underestimated. Another factor is that the pattern of applications is affected by the provision of additional places the previous year and the perceived likelihood of obtaining places at preferred schools.

6.20 There was variation between planning areas: the Moleseys area had exactly the number predicted; the Dittons & Weston Green area had 38 more pupils than forecast (10.6%); the Esher & Claygate area had 5 fewer pupils than forecast (-4%); the Walton & Hersham area had 5 more pupils than forecast (1.3%); the Weybridge area had 7 fewer pupils than forecast (-3%); the Cobham & Oxshott area had 2 fewer pupils than forecast (-1.5%).

SECONDARY

Historic numbers of Secondary pupils in Elmbridge

6.21 The table below provides historical information on the total number of available secondary places in year 7 in Elmbridge (the PAN), compared to the actual number of year 7 pupils. This provides the number of spare places in the Borough (a negative figure shows a shortage of places). Parental preferences are given to indicate the demand for places each year.

Actions that were taken to provide secondary places in September 2011

6.22 An additional 30 places were added at Esher High School responding to a bulge coming through from primary schools in Esher and Claygate.

Secondary forecasts in Elmbridge

6.23 Our estimates of the future need for secondary places are based on taking the historic transfer ratio from Year 6 to Year 7 in the borough, and applying this to our estimated numbers for future Year 6 cohorts. The transfer ratio has risen each year since 2008/9. The table below indicates that the number of year 7 students starting in secondary education in Elmbridge is on average about 75% of the number of year 6 pupils the academic year prior. This indicates that there are a relatively large number of year 6 pupils that apply for independent education in and around the borough. The past ratios are as follows:

6.24 Based on the transfer ratios presented above, the table below estimates the number of pupils that will require a secondary school place in Elmbridge from 2012 – 2021. This is compared to the total number of available places in Elmbridge in the future (the PAN). The 'spare' places refer to the projected demand compared to the total number of available places.

Actions taken to provide secondary places in 2012 and implications for the future planning period

- 6.25 Currently there is sufficient capacity in Year 7 in Elmbridge. However, numbers are forecast to rise steadily from 2013 leading to a likely need for an additional form of entry by 2015. If the numbers continue to increase as projected, a further 5 forms of entry will be required to accommodate extra pupils by 2021.
- 6.26 Officers recommend that Esher High School be expanded with permanent accommodation by two forms of entry by 2015. Other schools are being considered for enlargement to meet demand from 2016 and beyond. Projections will need to be carefully monitored to identify any change in the transfer rate from primary schools due, for example, to the impact of the recession, which may lead to a further demand for places.






Accuracy of secondary forecasts

- 6.27 It is useful to understand how accurate the forecasts are year on year. This is done by comparing the number of year 7 pupils that were admitted to Elmbridge secondary schools in 2011, with the number that was forecast in the previous year.
- 6.28 There were 19 more Year 7 pupils than indicated by the November 2010 forecast, which was 2.3% higher than forecast.


