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Item / paper title: Surrey's Joint Emotional Wellbeing and Mental Health Commissioning Strategy for Children and Young People 2014-17

Purpose of item / paper	To provide an update on Surrey Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) Collaborative and Surrey County Council's Children and Young People's Emotional Wellbeing and Mental Health Commissioning Strategy. This commissioning strategy was presented to the board in June; this report highlights progress and next steps.

Improving children's health and wellbeing 2. Developing a preventative approach 3. Promoting emotional wellbeing and mental health 4. Improving older adults' health and wellbeing 5. Safeguarding the population <p>The Children and Young People's Strategy 2014-17 sets out the strategy for delivering and improving children's health wellbeing. Emotional wellbeing and mental health is one of the priorities of the Children and Young People's Strategy 2014-17. The strategy reported on here therefore supports the delivery of both the Children and Young People's Strategy 2014 -2017 and the CCG's commissioning intentions.</p>
Financial implications - confirmation that any financial implications have been included within the paper	The Joint Emotional Wellbeing and Mental Health Commissioning Strategy for Children and Young People 2014-17 provides an overview of commissioning spend by Surrey County Council and the Surrey CCG Collaborative.
Consultation / public involvement – activity taken or planned	<p>A range of stakeholders were invited to comment on the draft Surrey Joint Emotional Wellbeing and Mental Health Commissioning Strategy via 'Surrey Says'. The survey was available from 11 November 2013 - 9 December 2013. In addition two separate evening focus group sessions for children and young people were held. A total of 57 responses to the strategy were received.</p> <p>Further public engagement was undertaken between 30th July and 15th October 2014 to learn from the key priorities of GPs as commissioners of CAMHS, multi-professionals, parents / carers and service users.</p>
