Glossary of types of care referred to in the report

An establishment where care is provided, rather than that care being Residential care provided in a person's own home. A residential care home has to be home registered with the Care Quality Commission (CQC) **Care home with** A care establishment which is able to provide care and nursing tasks. nursing/ nursing Registered nurses will be part of the staff. This type of home has to be registered with the Care Quality Commission (CQC) care Assistance with daily living activities and care tasks for a temporary period, usually up to six weeks, to enable a person to regain skills. This may often be someone who has been in hospital and needs some Reablement additional input for a short time to regain skills and confidence. This is sometimes referred to as a step down or intermediate care. This may be provided in a residential or nursing home environment, or through visits to people in their own homes A non-residential facility that supports the health, nutritional, social **Day Care** support, and daily living needs of adults in professionally staffed, group settings Short-term accommodation in a facility outside the home, often to provide **Respite Care** carers with a break from caring Extra Care Housing in an extension of traditional supported housing and **Extra Care** allows adults to live as independently as possible, with the reassurance of onsite care support when they need it.
