Dear Mr Skellett,

We are writing to you with regard to traffic speeds in Church Lane, Oxted between the roundabout and the junction with the A25. Several local residents have observed significant numbers of vehicles far exceeding the current 30mph speed limit.

Following these observations, and in light of comments from local residents, a questionnaire inviting views was circulated to all households in Church Lane, Wheeler Avenue, Peter Avenue and Haywain during November this year.

The following statements highlight our concerns and the belief that action needs to be taken:

- 95% of residents who responded to our survey considered that speeding traffic in Church Lane was a serious
 issue that needed to be addressed. This increased to 100% for residents in the section where speeds are seen as
 greatest. (See Appendix E)
- Representatives from the three community areas on the road (The Cricket Club, The Royal British Legion and the First Church of Christ, Scientist) were similarly minded.
- The road is a route for school children who walk to school and there are bus stops used by them and elderly people.
- There are a number of driveways and two parking spaces which have concealed entrances or are on bends in the road.
- Church Lane is an access road to the station car park and is used by commuters hurrying to catch trains.
- There is a park bordering the lane, where numerous ball games are played and there are instances of children
 and balls straying onto the road. (see Appendix B)
- On the Southerly side of the road, the pavements are located at either end only. This forces people to cross the road close to junctions if they wish to walk on the pavement. At the Eastern end visibility is obscured due to a bend when crossing the road. (see Appendix H)
- There are narrow points on the road requiring HGV's delivering to Oxted, buses and other large vehicles to move into the middle of the road. Speeding cars have been observed at these points braking violently to avoid collision with oncoming traffic.
- We have regularly seen traffic appearing to exceed the speed limit with speeds up to 60 mph.
- The 30mph sign on the left on entry to Church Lane from the A25 is difficult to spot while negotiating the bend.
 There are no additional speed reminders at any other point on the road. (See Appendix I)

We believe that it is only a matter of time before speeding traffic in Church Lane causes serious injury and possible death. Our survey provides an opportunity for the council to note your constituents' concerns and take appropriate preventive action. Please find attached samples of comments made by local residents in addition to photographic evidence and other information. Should you wish, we would be happy to share our questionnaires with you on a confidential basis.

We look forward to hearing the council's response and to demonstrate a desire to ensure that Church Lane becomes a safe place for all people who use it. Many thanks for your time and consideration.



Location of majority of observed speed issues in Church Lane.


