
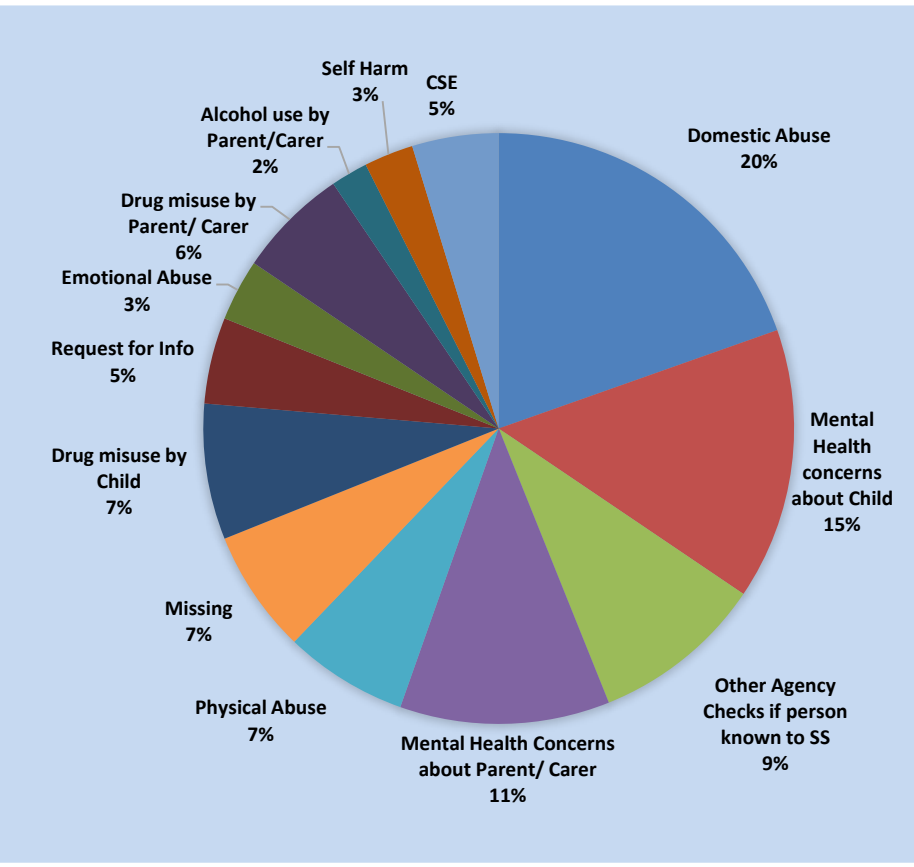

Early Help Outcomes for Surrey Heath

- Children, families and communities are, and feel, empowered through the services to bring about sustainable change.
- Greater understanding of the system of organisations working in Surrey Heath
- Cohesive coordinated, more effective & quicker responses within services in SH- more integrated
- Reduction in need for acute services
- Every child, YP & family who are in need of help, receive the help from the relevant agencies in the local family partnership in a timely way, and are able to recognise the progress they have made.
- More young people managed within the school system
- An ever improving service
- Keeping families safe in their home, ensuring stability.
- Early identification of issues, problems and concerns matrix.
- Reducing evictions especially in private rented and social housing
- Improving outcomes in relation to domestic abuse, including child to parent violence

What works locally

- The partnership group meeting (every 2 months, early help family partnership group)
- The children centres/ family support workers who work closely with local schools enables a response to be gathered quickly and effectively. Therefore a strong partnership. However this is now threatened by funding constraints.
- Emergency housing for young people through supported lodgings contract
- Good services 0-5/ teenager, but some cuts made
- Charitable funding
- Discretionary Housing payments (debt support)
- Good partnership working with Voluntary sector
- Good partnership between social services, police, SFS, health, Police
- Child, YP, family specific approach (reasonable, bespoke, holistic offer)
- We have the least links of YP to crime but highest quota of PYPS. We are the embodiment of excellence in identification and supporting sustainable resolution with YP in crime and disorder reduction.
- Prescription for young carers (surrey prescription)
- Overall, children in the early years make very good progress in Surrey Heath when compared with the other Surrey Districts and Boroughs. In 2016, 82.4% of all children achieved a good level of progress
- Children with English as an Additional Language (EAL), children claiming Free School Meals and Summer-born children make good to very good progress at the Foundation Stage.
- Surrey Heath has the highest attainment scores at GCSE amongst all Surrey Districts and Boroughs.
- Surrey Heath has the lowest proportion of conceptions per 1000 females aged 10-17 amongst all Surrey Districts and Boroughs.
- The number and proportion of children becoming looked after by the Local Authority are lower than the Surrey average.
- The proportion of children who are; Children in Need with 'Family Dysfunction' as their main presenting need; Children in Need with 'Abuse or Neglect' is well below the Surrey average.
- The number and proportion of children becoming looked after by the Local Authority are lower than the Surrey averages.
- The proportion of young people (NEET) in Surrey Heath is very low.
- The number of young people arrested, and linked to offences, is well below the Surrey average.

Gap Analysis

- Link between health and well being
- Children centres strong, but there is a time lag for 5-11 year old children.
- Family support at secondary (and primary), who will speak to the families?
- To what extent can we afford to deliver the outcomes we all desire?
- We have area policing teams rather than the previous neighbourhood specific model and 67% less police youth specific staff.
- There appears to be a large difference between the performance of boys and the performance of girls in the Foundation Stage. 90.2% of girls achieved good progress; 74.8% of boys.

Priorities for development (Early Help Offer)

- Support for children, young people and families who have experienced domestic abuse, including child to parent violence. This would include equipping the workforce to support families effectively.
- To ensure effective and inclusive engagement and consultation with local communities via the Family Partnership Areas, to ensure we are providing the right support at the right time for families.
- To empower parents to access appropriate support for their families through promotion of local resources including the Family Information Service and mental health services.
- To develop a coordinated and effective 0-18 Parenting Offer within the Borough.
- To develop a private landlord forum to address eviction.

Ernst Young Findings / Recommendations

In 2017 / 18, Surrey Heath will have 291 families who need access to targeted (122 families) and universal plus (169 families) Early Help Services.
