

Tandridge Community Safety Partnership Plan 2013 – 2014

1. Introduction

Tandridge Community Safety Partnership (formerly known as the Crime and Disorder Reduction Partnership) is required to produce an annual Community Safety Plan showing how its members will work together to tackle key crime and disorder priorities in the coming year.

A Strategic Assessment has been undertaken which made use of wide range of data as well as feedback from residents, to identify the priorities that the Partnership will focus on

Feedback from the last Resident Survey (2011) showed that crime and anti-social behaviour are key concerns for local residents. Reassuringly, the survey also highlighted an improvement in resident's perception in all areas of community safety that they were asked to comment on.

Analysis of the data has led to the identification of the following priorities:

- 1. Reducing Antisocial Behaviour** *(with an increased focus on victims and young people)*
- 2. Reducing Serious Acquisitive Crime** *(with a continuing focus on rural crime)*
- 3. Tackling Domestic Abuse**
- 4. Substance Misuse**
- 5. Counter Terrorism**

Each of the identified priorities has an associated Action Plan. The Plan will be delivered through multi-agency working groups, which are shown below. Further details on each group can be found at the end of the document in Appendix A.

County-wide priorities have also been identified and will be addressed by county-wide services and partnership working to deliver improved outcomes. Information and resources will be shared to avoid duplication at a local level in areas of overlap.

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4. PCC Priorities

The Police and Crime commissioner, Kevin Hurley has published the Police and Crime Plan for Surrey which highlights the following priorities:

- Taking a zero-tolerance approach to policing in Surrey
- Delivering more visible policing
- Putting victims at the centre of the Criminal Justice System
- Giving the public more opportunities to have their say about policing
- Protecting local policing, supporting them against unreasonable criticism whilst promoting the highest standards of service.

5. Performance Monitoring

Delivering the priorities cannot be achieved by one organisation alone. Partners all have a role in dealing with problems and wherever possible, preventing them from happening in the first place. A joined up approach will ensure more effective and robust methods are adopted to deal with the identified priority areas.

Multi-agency delivery groups have been identified for each local priority as previously shown. Progress against these priorities will be routinely monitored by the District CSP Working Group on a six weekly basis. Joint

Action Plans will be monitored by the bi-monthly East Surrey Community Safety Group to assess overall impact.

Regular reports on progress will be fed back to each CSP meeting. The report will also include any details of under performance or other obstacles that are likely to prevent the targets being achieved. This will enable partners to identify and influence what additional support or resources may be needed to improve delivery.

Funding

The current financial climate places an ever increasing emphasis on partnership working and an incentive to improve operational effectiveness. The Partnership will continue to maximise funding through jointly funded initiatives and projects with our CSP neighbours. We will also explore opportunities to achieve even greater value for money by identifying new and innovative approaches to the delivery of services.

Appendix A Working Group Details

Community Incident Action Group (CIAG) meets monthly, focusing on individuals whose behaviour is causing harm to local communities. Its members reflect those of the CSP at a delivery level and include, police, council officers, registered social landlords, education providers, officers from youth support services, health and adult and children services. The key focus of the meeting is to prevent and deter adults and young people from behaving in an antisocial manner and becoming involved in more serious criminal activity.

Drug and Alcohol CIAG (DCIAG) specifically focuses on adults whose chaotic substance misuse and lifestyle has a serious impact on the community. Individuals are given intensive support by the Drug and Alcohol Outreach Worker) with the aim of engaging and retaining them in appropriate treatment. This post is jointly funded by Tandridge, Reigate and Banstead and Mole Valley CSPs.

Short Life Joint Action Groups/Case conferences meet on a needs basis with specific partners to address crime and disorder issues of concern to local communities. This approach allows the key specific partners to quickly come together to discuss and resolve problems showing tangible outcomes.

Tandridge CSP Working Group this district group oversees performance management of the local Action Plans. Its core membership includes the Police District Inspector, Surrey CC Community Partnership and Committee Officer and Tandridge DC Community Safety Manager. Other agencies are included as and when required.

Tandridge Youth and Family Group this new group is being established to focus particular attention on those young people (and their families), that are deemed to be 'at risk'. Its aim is to encourage closer partnership working, co-ordinate activities and maximise available resources across the District. Its membership includes officers from, Youth Support Services, Schools Confederation, SCC, Surrey Police and TDC. The Group will work to identify key priorities, gaps in provision and seek funding opportunities.

East Surrey Domestic Abuse Working Group oversees activities to address, highlight and reduce domestic abuse in East Surrey. It acts as the monitoring group for the East Surrey Domestic Abuse Action Plan. It links into the Surreywide Domestic Abuse Groups, responsible for monitoring the Outreach Services SLA and developing the countywide Strategy.

East Surrey Substance Misuse Group acts as the planning body for tackling substance misuse and related crime and disorder in the east of Surrey. Its core membership includes representatives from Drug and Alcohol Action Team (DAAT, Surrey Police, Health and officers from East Surrey Districts and Boroughs. The Group monitors the East Surrey Drug and Alcohol Plan.

East Surrey community Safety Group has been formed to identify key issues and co-ordinate response and delivery across the four districts and boroughs in East Surrey. Its members represent the local authorities, county council and police with a focus on maximising the use of resources across the four areas to achieve greater value for money, avoid duplication and share best practice.

Prolific and Priority Offender Management Panel (PPOMP). Addressing PPO's is a statutory CSP requirement. The ES PPOMP focuses on two strands of the PPO Strategy: *Catch and Convict* – taking firm enforcement measures against prolific offenders and *Rehabilitate and Resettle* – increasing the number of offenders who stop offending by offering a range of supportive interventions.
